Relative to the ARD business meeting, the New Seeds Initiative and the ARD Strategic Agenda were two important agenda items that need our immediate attention.

As discussed, the New Seeds Initiative is a collective effort to innovatively advance ARD's priorities and goals with an emphasis on making critical contributions to solutions to help achieve agricultural and rural prosperity in the U.S. As such, these one-time, two-year innovation grants will be awarded to support the development and enhancement of projects ideas that will enhance the 1890 multi-state capacity and competitiveness to provide solutions to improve the quality of life of the people we serve. ### '18 Farm Bill appropriations undecided; CR in effect

The current Farm Bill expired on Sept. 30 but this will have minimal impact on research and Cooperative Extension programs for now. If an agreement is not reached before the new Congress convenes on Jan. 3, 2019, both the House and the Senate will have to introduce new legislation and revote.

The key issues to be resolved between the versions of the Farm Bill passed by the House and the Senate are commodities, conservation, and nutrition.

The SNAP reforms/changes are by far the biggest issue facing the conferees (47 conferees for the House and nine conferees for the Senate). While not directly related to the changes in SNAP, the increased role for Extension in delivering the SNAP-Ed pro-

gram, which was included in the House version of the bill, also remains unresolved by conferees.

Research, Education and Extension priorities identified by the Committee on Legislative Policy, such as the Challenge of Change recommendations and deferred maintenance were addressed in one or both bills. Also, both bills make changes to the 1890 capacity formulas to benefit Central State University.

Both the House (May 16) and the Senate (May 24) Appropriations committees have approved their respective versions of the FY 2019 Agriculture Appropriations bill. The bill funds NIFA and other USDA agencies and the Food and Drug Administration. The House and Senate included increases for McIntire-Stennis and AFRI. The Senate also included increases for 1890 Capacity Programs.

The draft ARD Strategic Agenda, with a focus on people, programs, partnerships, platforms and places, will be framed to elevate the research and education mission areas in the food and agricultural sciences at the 1890s. As discussed, this Strategic Agenda will be based, in large part, on the USDA Secretary Perdue's Rural Prosperity report, but will also extract elements from the National Academies' Science Breakthroughs 2030, APLU's Challenge of Change, NI-FA's Strategic Plan and ESCOP's revised Science Roadmap. To assist with collating your comments on our Strategic Agenda, a template was developed and distributed. Please submit the templates to Dr. Alton Thompson, ARD executive director on or before Nov. 5.

As you are aware, over the past several months, the National Impacts Database Committee has been working on a redesign of the website along with procedural changes to administration, submission and review of Impact Statements for participating institutions. These changes are designed to improve the public-facing and navigation aspects of the website along with the implementation of a review process to improve the quality of system's impact statements. Moving forward, impact statements will be submitted by individuals that have been approved by your institution and trained by the National Impacts Database Committee. Once submitted, impact statements will be reviewed by a member of the National Impacts Database Review Team.

Dr. Thompson circulated an email to all ARD **Directors requesting:** 

- Institutional Representatives From each institution, name/contact information for the following:
- Two (2) institution research administrators
- Two (2) institution research contacts. These individuals will have input rights to the database.
- (Three (3) impact research editors: These individuals will have input rights to add impact statements to the database.
- Impact Statement Reviewers each research director is requested to provide name/ contact information for possible reviewers of impact statements from their institution. Please submit this information to Dr. Thomp-

son as soon as possible.

The Impacts Database Committee will beta test this new system this fall. The target launch will be in January 2019.

### NIFA announces FY 2019 RFP

The FY 2019 Agricultural Research at 1890 Land-Grant Institutions has been posted to ezFeds Grants.

#### Funding Opportunity Number: USDA-NIFA-10205-1445XXXX-19-0001. Open Date: Oct. 5

#### Close Date: Nov. 7 – 5 p.m. Eastern Time

This RFA is being released prior to the passage of FY 2019 appropriations bill. Enactment of Continuing Resolution (CR) or an appropriations act may affect the availability or level of funding for this program. Subject to any FY 2019 CR, NIFA will distribute funds to the institutions quarterly and according to the amounts allocated in FY 2018. NIFA will make adjustments to the allocations for FY 2018 once the FY 2019 appropriations are finalized.

APLU's remaining priority lines were funded at the 2018 level. The Senate passed the Agricultural Appropriations Bill as part of a four-bill "mini-bus" on Aug. 1. The House passed a "mini-bus" appropriations package on Sept. 26 that included a Continuing Resolution (CR) through Dec. 7 for any appropriations bill that was not enacted. It is possible that a final appropriations bill for USDA will be completed during the lame duck session of Congress in November and December, but that likely depends on the outcome of the November elections.
