In-state Extension Experience:

During the 26 years Cooperative Extension career, site visits were conducted in every county in North Carolina.

Served on the State Administrative Extension Council for the North Carolina Cooperative Extension System and chaired council meetings when they were conducted at North Carolina A & T State University.

Early extension work experiences included; employment as an Assistant Negro County Agricultural Agent with the North Carolina State University and Wayne County, Goldsboro, N.C.

Additionally, my experiences involved also serving as an Assistant (Negro) County Agricultural Agent in Greene County, North Carolina. The work experiences were expanded and comprised of the coordination of all "Negro Extension Work" as well as the supervision of the local staff of Home Economics Agent and full-time secretary.

Out-of-State Employment Experience:

As a youth specialist with the New York Extension Cooperative Extension Service in Wayne County, New York, my job duties consisted of identifying and organizing the children of seasonal agricultural worker families (migrants) to enhance their educational knowledge and experiences; and their quality of life.

Teaching Experiences: These experiences involved serving as a Graduate Teaching Assistant for the Rural Sociology Department at Cornell University. The responsibilities also included weekly lectures, lesson plan revisions under the guidance of Professor O.F. Larson (Retired). Assisted with student evaluations including test preparations and administration.

Served as a Graduate Teacher Assistant under the guidance of three professors for the Rural Sociology 100 course. The lecture involved teaching of more than 200 students. However, Main responsibilities consisted of focusing on a group of 15 to 20 students.
