May Deadlines Critical for ARD Funding Impact Database

It's time to collect impacts. Impact statements are due in the ARD Impact Database by May 1. Our ability to demonstrate relevant impacts may influence decisions that determine the level of funding we receive to continue to do our work to educate, conduct research and offer Cooperative Extension programs. As such, we need to "tell our story" to our funders, potential partners and collaborators and communities.

These impacts will be added to the database on the ARD website. While we recommend that you submit at least two statements, you can submit more.

It's strongly recommended that faculty review the short video link/PowerPoint on how to write effective impact statements. It

will help significantly with impact writing.

Sample impacts can be found on the <u>ARD website</u> Impact statements are to be submitted to Dr. Valerie L. Giddings, <u>vlgiddin@ncat.edu</u>. Remember that only research directors or his or her designee can submit these impact statements.

Two researchers win ARD top research awards


Two 1890 researchers received the top awards during

the recent biannual symposium. Dr. Yadong Qi from Southern University received the 2017 Morrison-Evans Outstanding Scientist Award and Dr. Raymon Shange from Tuskegee University received the B.D. Mayberry Young Scientist Award.

Qi has a bachelor of science in forestry from Inner Mongolia Agricultural University in Hohhot, China; a master's of science in forest ecology and hydrology from Northeast Forestry University in Harbin, China and a doctorate in forestry from the Stephen H. Austin State University in Texas.

She has been a professor at Southern University in Baton Rouge, LA for 25 years and currently serves as interim department chair and director of the Graduate Urban Forestry in the Department of Urban Forestry and Natural Resources in the College of Agricultural, Family and Consumer Sciences.

Qi has 33 years of research experience in tree physiology, ecol-

Qi has published more than 110 scientific papers, includ-

ing 52 refereed journal articles, 11 books/book chapters, 33 proceedings and nine Cooperative Extension papers. Her articles have been published in the leading Science Citation Index (SCI) journals such as Agriculture and Forest Meteorology; Urban Forestry and Urban Greening; Molecules; Food Chemistry, Biomacromolecules, Carbohydrate Polymers and RSC Advances.

Shange has a bachelor of science in biology from Xavier University, a master's of arts in natural philosophy from Howard University and a doctorate in integrative biosciences from Tuskegee University. Shange currently serves as the director of the Carver Integrative Sustainability Center at Tuskegee University, which involves researchers, Cooperative Extension staff, students and USDA staff – the Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Forest Service, the Farm Service Agency and Rural Development — all located in the same campus building and working together over a multiple county region serving farmers, businesses, schools, cities and counties.

Shange has been very aggressive in securing funds to support research for his program and for his students. He has served as PI/Co-PI on competitive grants totaling more than \$2.7 million. His research programs are innovative, integrative and are focused on sustainable and innovative solutions to challenges faced by producers, particularly limited-resource producers.

Shange has an excellent scholarly trajectory with more than 12 peer-reviewed publications and over 23 abstracts and non-refereed publications. Shange is intimately involved in extension and outreach programs and in international work.

He has received several awards and honors, most notably the Tuskegee University Outstanding Faculty Performance Award for Service and Outreach; Tuskegee University Faculty Performance Award for Teaching (2014); and Faculty Fellow for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Society.
