

# INTERNATIONAL STUDENT NETWORKING EVENT



On September 30, the Centers for Foreign Language Instruction and International Education held an International Student Networking Event in the School of Pharmacy and Health Professions (SPHP) building. The event featured presentations by Dr. Leesa P. Thomas-Banks, Vice Provost for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Sungjae Hwang, Associate Professor in the Department of Kinesiology.

Phillip Broussard, Director of the Center for International Education, warmly welcomed attendees and introduced the presenters. Dr. Hwang then gave a presentation titled "Embracina Olympism and Heritage" and shared his experience from the faculty-led trip to Greece. He showed photos of the students and faculty at historical sites like Olympia, Trizonia, Delphi, and Athens, and talked about how they immersed themselves in the local culture and traditions. He also noted that the trip was truly meaningful because it gave students the chance to learn lessons they couldn't in class, while also allowing them to bond with their professors and peers.

Dr. Thomas-Banks followed with a warm greeting, sharing her experience as an international student during her college years. She reaffirmed her commitment to ensuring that international students feel supported and thrive in their academic journey at UMES. The event provided a great opportunity for international students to connect, exchange personal stories, and foster a stronger sense of community at UMES.


## \* FALL SEMESTER HIGHLIGHTS



A Journey to Japan: UMES Student Makes History with Prestigious Scholarships

## Isaiah Butler Interview

Isaiah Butler, a senior majoring in Hospitality and Tourism with a Foreign Language Minor (Japanese), has been awarded prestigious scholarships this year and will be studying abroad at Toyo University in Japan for the Spring 2025 semester. Isaiah, the third UMES student to study abroad to Japan with scholarships, sat down with us to share his experiences, challenges, and exciting plans for the future.

**Q1:** Congratulations on being awarded the Gilman Award and the Freeman Asia Award! How does it feel to be UMES's third student to study abroad to Japan with scholarships?

Isaiah: Since coming to UMES two semesters ago, I have accomplished just about everything I've set out to do as far as language studies go. In High school, I made it my goal to one day travel to Japan, a nation I've been interested in for so very long, and now to finally be able to say that I'm going there soon is an amazing feeling. Not only has the journey been made easy with the help of my teachers and other staff, all of the hard work I put into learning the language and understanding the culture are paying off and I couldn't be happier.

**Q2:** What have been the most challenging experiences on your journey, and how did you overcome them?

**Isaiah:** I haven't faced many challenges on my journey of applying for scholarships, which honestly really speaks to the amount of support I've received during this process. I'd have to say the biggest challenge I've faced is managing my work, school, and life balance, which I overcame with time and plenty of planning. I know how to use my time much better now.

**Q3:** As a Foreign Language Minor, what benefits do you believe it offers? What have been the most rewarding aspects of being a foreign language minor?

Isaiah: I came to UMES looking to refine and eventually master my Japanese, so being a minor in the language shows my dedication to the art. I am given the benefit of being taken much more seriously than others when I'm applying for scholarships. More than what I would be if I was taking Japanese as a mere elective. I'd even go as far as to say that I'm seen as more credible when it comes to tutoring Japanese on campus.

**Q4:** Can you share your experience with Japanese tutoring? How did you get started, and what have you found most fulfilling about it?

Isaiah: Japanese tutoring is the most fun job I've ever had. I started last semester as a way to make money doing something that I enjoyed and it is one of the best decisions I've ever made. I go into every tutoring session looking forward to helping students understand the Japanese language. I love getting to work with other students and aiding in their pursuit of mastery. I see a bit of myself in everyone I teach because I remember when I was still learning the basics, and I pride myself on my ability to teach in a way that is understandable to all.

**Isaiah:** I am set to travel next March and will be gone for 6 months while I attend Toyo university in Tokyo Japan, a prestigious private university. My goal for Japan is to go and immerse myself in the language and culture to finally gain mastery over my language skills. I want to go and indulge myself in all the aspects of culture I've only been able to see through books and television thus far. Two of the biggest things I look forward to meeting new people and trying out different foods while I'm there.

**Q6:** What are your long-term career or personal goals, and how do you plan to achieve them?

**Isaiah:** I want to one day fuse my experience in hospitality and my language proficiency to work in the travel field. Whether it be as a multilingual travel agent or a translator, I aim to learn many languages and unite the world with hospitality.

**Q7:** What advice would you give to future UMES students who aspire to follow a similar path?

Isaiah: To all future UMES students who look to follow a similar path to me, YOU CAN DO IT! I have accomplished all of this in just three semesters, just imagine all that you can achieve with more time than I had. UMES is full of opportunities, it's up to you to take advantage of as many as you can. Work hard, take risks, stand out, get to know people, and forge healthy relationships with your teachers. **Q8:** Lastly, is there anything you'd like to share with your friends and family?

I start to relax and enjoy myself, to grow more confident. I am very grateful to my instructors."
